## Opening Arena Show

Scouts celebrated the opening of the Jamboree with Wednesday morning's arena show, led by Eagle Scout Anthony Thomas. Anthony became the BSA's 2 millionth Eagle when he earned the rank last year.

The show opened with a parade of American flags through the audience, one from each troop present. Flag bearers got special seats in the front of the arena.

Secretary of Defense Robert Gates, a Distinguished Eagle Scout and past president of the National Eagle Scout Association, gave the opening address. He recalled a father-son camping trip he took while he was the director of the CIA, saying that some of the adventure of the outdoors was lost because he had to bring bodyguards and a satellite communications truck with him wherever he went.

Secretary Gates encouraged the scouts to be accountable and to take personal



responsibility for their actions, something he said is a rare quality now.

Chief Scout Executive Bob Mazzuca thanked the military and Lt. Col. Jack Haefner, Fort A.P. Hill garrison commander, for their dedication to our country. He also shared a story of the conversations that have been sparked because he's worn his scout uniform.

Scouts also heard from Miss America 2010 Caressa Cameron and Virginia Governor Bob McDonnell. The U.S. Air Force Honor Guard Drill Team performed tightly choreographed maneuvers with M-1 Garand rifles, the U.S. Army Herald Trumpets performed and the U.S. Army Golden Knights parachuted into the arena.



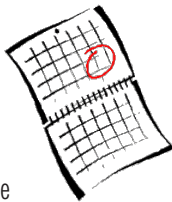
