## DID YOU KNOW...

What do I do in severe weather?

It is important to remember what will occur in case of severe weather. You will hear a one-minute wailing sound following by a public address message giving you weather information or directions. This information will be repeated on QBSA, 95.1 FM. If no instructions are given, follow these guidelines:

- Secure all troop site areas
- Go to the nearest area where your troop leaders or staff will assist you
- Find cover out of the weather in tents or buildings
- Stay in the shelter until the weather passes
- Do not take shelter beneath trees, power lines, or antennas
- If you are sheltering in a tent with aluminum poles or metal cots, keep as far away from them as possible, and do not come in contact with the poles or other metal objects.

Medical Update

Not every bee sting needs to be seen in the medical center. If the person experiences more than minor swelling, swelling of the tongue or difficulty breathing then send him to us immediately.


Please continue to emphasize personal hygiene. A lot of the Scouts are just plain dirty and this is causing rashes.

If a Scout has a minor rash, please consider going to the trading post and getting a cream like Cortaid or other cortisone

containing cream. It should be applied twice a day.

Please have the Scouts apply powder such as Gold bond or other such powders to creases in the skin such as the groin and armpit.

Safety Makes a Difference Everyone should have received STOPP training. Keep these simple ideas in mind for a safe Jamboree for you and others. Stop before you act consider the risks



- Observe your surroundings, what are the risks, how can I reduce them
- Plan to reduce the risks and implement your plan
- Proceed with safety. Supervise, and look for ways to improve

Remember that the Subcamp evacuation assembly area is South of the East Shower house on the dirt road.
