CLOSING SHOW STARTS/ENDS WITH A BANG

Nearly 75,000 attendees were not disappointed after standing in long security lines to enter the Fort A.P. Hill amphitheatre Sunday. President George W. Bush took the stage on cue, after being delayed twice before.

President Bush opened with a message of condolence for the 4 fallen Scouters earlier




in the week, stating that they were role models to the Scouts whom they led.

The President continued to commend the of the BSA for having the values that are necessary in society, and the moral preparation to know right from wrong. "Scouts have made America a stronger and better nation," he said. He recognized the more than 1.4 million hours of service to communities across the nation by the national Good Turn for America program. President Bush asked scouts to remember that "We make a living by what we get; we make a life by what we give."

The President charged Scouts to be community leaders and "men of conviction and character." He further charged those present to follow three lessons: Listen to your mother, always remember where you came from and what you believe, and realize that

life will grow in meaning when you serve a cause greater than yourself.



President Bush then left the are-

na, but not before shaking hands with many of the Scouts, military personnel, and dignitaries that were on stage and in the front of the crowd.

The highlights of the show included a National Court of Honor, convened by Chief Scout Executive Roy L. Williams and National BSA President John Cushman, to recognize the extraordinary bravery of Scout Kendell Call, who at great risk to himself saved the life of his father during the tragic accident earlier in the Jamboree. Kendell was awarded the Honor Medal with Crossed Palms.

The show closed with a candlelit rededication ceremony, followed by a thunderous display of fireworks and a laser light show, to the delight of the Scouts, Scouters,



and guests in attendance.



DEPARTURE INFORMATION

As we start to wind down Jamboree 2005, we'd be remiss if we didn't thank the Scouts and Scouters of Subcamp 3 for their extraordinary Scout spirit. With the heat came the potential for short tempers. Thanks to those that helped police the Subcamp and the arena, for all those who brought valuables to Lost & Found, and to those who saw the need and took collections for those less fortunate then ourselves. You all exemplify the ideals of the BSA.

Be aware that the gravel road running through our Subcamp to Subcamp 2 will become a thoroughfare starting on Tuesday. Tractor-trailers and busses are planning to use that road to ac-

cess Subcamp 2.

Staff vehicles will be allowed into the Subcamp after 4 PM Tuesday. Vehicles will not be allowed to interfere with the Jamboree bus line; parking will be limited to the west side of Engineer Road, north of the freezers. Vehicle pickup will be on a limited basis Tuesday, depending on Subcamp vehicle availability.

Early departures must check out starting with the Commissioners. No units may leave without filling out the Commissioner Checklist, which Leaders should have received at the Monday evening Leaders meeting.

Upon departure, follow the

"Leave No Trace" philosophy of "if you brought it with you, pack it out." The dumpsters are for trash only. Gateways, building materials, tables, and other "non trash" items must be removed by the unit that brought them in. Do not leave trash around the rear Subcamp dumpster. If that dumpster is full, use the dumpsters in the front of the Subcamp.

The commissary will provide a kiosk-style brunch for Wednesday morning. Troops may pick them up between 5 and 7 AM.

As units are departing on Wednesday, please keep the roads open. Thanks for your help to bring the Jamboree to a safe and orderly conclusion.
